The Certificate in Māori Studies [Level 4] is designed to:

- Provide foundation skills that will enable students to progress further into tertiary studies.
- Provide basic skills in Māori Language and customs, reading, writing, listening and speaking.

Successful completion of this certificate allows students to continue with the Bachelor of Arts (Māori) or another EIT programme in the following semester.

Your Career Opportunities

Skills developed in this 17 week course enhance chances of gaining employment in a number of fields where a basic knowledge of te reo Māori is required.

Additional costs

- \$50 approximately for stationery

ENTRY CRITERIA

- Entry is open to anyone who is 16 years of age or older. A personal interview may be part of the application process.

English language entry requirement

If English is not your first language An interview is part of the acceptance process for international students where this will be discussed.

Entry with credit

You may already have some knowledge or skills (from other study or experience) that can be recognized as credit towards completing this programme. If credit is awarded, you may no longer be deemed a full-time student for allowances. Please enquire about this first before you enrol.

Class times

- Hawke's Bay: 9.00am – 3.00 pm Monday to Thursday. Wānanga – 5pm to 8pm, days tbc.
- Gisborne: 9.00am – 3.00pm Monday to Thursday, semester two only. Wānanga – 5.30pm to 8.30pm Wednesdays, semester one only.

Noho Marae dates

These stays are compulsory for Wānanga students:

- **Intake One:** 4-5 March, 24-26 March, 5-7 May, 9-11 June and 23-25 June.
- **Intake Two:** 29-30 July, 18-20 August, 22-24 September, 27-29 October and 24-26 November.

Individual study hours

A half hour for each classroom hour i.e. 10 hours per week.

Facilities

Hawke's Bay

The marae complex is primarily a teaching facility for Māori language and culture courses. Māori Studies facilities include a whareniui, kitchen, dining room, ablution area and a computer suite.

Tairāwhiti

Most classes are at Te Whatukura on Palmerston Road. Facilities include a kitchen, dining area and a computer suite. Video conferencing equipment is available.

Assessments

Assessments include oral, written and practical assignments. This programme is approved by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) but the programme does not consist of NZQA unit standards. It consists of NZQA approved "courses".

HOW TO ENROL

STEP 1

Organise payment of your fees. You will receive an invoice, or if you have been granted funding, the invoice may be sent to an alternative address if you have requested this on your enrolment.

STUDENT SERVICES LEVY
