Specialise your nursing knowledge

The Master of Nursing degree is a 240 credit (three to six years), applied clinically-focused programme characterised by advanced study in nursing.

You will develop advanced nursing knowledge, skills of critical analysis, constructive synthesis, advanced practice and research within your specialty area.

The Master of Nursing is awarded upon successful completion of four courses from the programme schedule plus MN9.490 Masterate Research Thesis, or MNSC9.001 Critical Inquiry for Nursing Practice and MNSC9.002 Research Project, followed by MN8.427 Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioners.

For nurses intending to apply for Nurse Practitioner registration, the following courses must be included in the schedule of study:

- MN8.401 Advanced Clinical Assessment and Diagnostic Reasoning
- MN8.402 Advanced Pathophysiology for Health **Professionals**
- MN8.409 Pharmacotherapeutics for Advanced Nursing/Midwifery Practice
- MN8.424 Registered Nurse Prescribing Practicum
- MN8.427 Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioner

It is recognised that those undertaking this programme are often engaged in full-time clinical practice and study

Where there is a clinical practice component to the learning, you need to be employed in a clinical setting.

This programme is accredited by the Nursing Council of New Zealand for the Nurse Practitioner pathway.

Where the applicant's undergraduate degree does not provide the basis of study at the level required for more advanced study, enrolment in transitional or undergraduate courses may be required before the applicant can be admitted.

Special conditions

Applicants must provide evidence of a current annual practising certificate with the Nursing Council of New Zealand.

Work-integrated learning

Some courses will require you to be actively involved in clinical practice in the area of specialty.

Online / blended delivery

Our postgraduate courses are offered either online or with blended delivery. This means that the majority of the work is located on a virtual teaching and learning platform with directed activities and learning that you work through. Lecturers work within the virtual classroom setting so that they maintain contact with you.

Blended delivery means that there are contact sessions or workshops with the bulk of the learning activity undertaken in the online environment.

This flexible delivery method allows you to study at your pace, in your place, at locations throughout New Zealand.

Workload

Generally the courses are delivered online. However, some courses may require attendance at online sessions or face-to-face workshops. Any requirement for attendance at face-to-face sessions is identified in the course information.

Each credit for the course represents 10 hours of learning/study time over the period of the course.

You are expected to spend subsequent time in independent/self-directed study, critical reflection, and work-integrated learning in your place of study or work.

Entry requirements

An interview may be part of the application process where required or appropriate.

The academic entry requirement for the Master of Nursing is one of the following:

 Completion of the HB3963 Postgraduate Diploma in Health Science (Registered Nurse Prescribing endorsement) with a B average or higher; or



English language entry requirements

Applicants from countries in which English is not the primary spoken language must demonstrate an acceptable level of English language fluency prior to acceptance in the programme. Ways in which English language fluency may be demonstrated include:

- · Completion of a programme of study in which English was the language of instruction (conditions apply*); or
- Approved scores on IELTS tests, namely an Academic score of 6.5 with no band lower than 6.0 achieved in a single test within the preceding year (or accepted international equivalents).

Entry with credit

Applicants may be admitted with credit transfer or recognition of prior learning. The Postgraduate Programmes Cluster Committee has discretion in the granting of academic credit.

Academic credit may be awarded as specified credit where there is a substantial match between previous learning and the course for which academic credit is sought; or unspecified credit where the learning is broadly relevant to, and at an equivalent level to, the course for which academic credit is sought.

Credit granted shall not be for course(s) completed as part of an undergraduate degree, nor shall credit be granted that exceeds one-half of the total programme credits.

A Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL)/entry with credit application pack is available on enrolment. It is recommended that applications for RPL/entry with credit are made as part of your initial application. Entry with credit cannot be processed until you are enrolled.

MN8.427	Advanced Practice for Nurse Practitioner This course further develops the practitioner's advanced knowledge and skills within the individual's specialty area. With clinical and academic mentorship, practitioners will demonstrate competencies consistent with an advanced practitioner role: leadership; consultancy; involvement in local and national health and socio-economic policy; research; interdisciplinary collaboration; and expert and expanded clinical practice including advanced assessment, differential diagnosis, treatment and evaluation.	8	60	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MN9.490	Masterate Research Thesis This course critically examines the philosophical, methodological and ethical issues that underpin research. The intent is to establish a sound foundation for the learner's developing knowledge and understanding of the nature and application of research. The aim will be to support the learner in identifying and formulating research questions and, the selection of appropriate research methodology and design in preparation for Masterate Thesis research. A range of current research methods will be explored in terms of the design, data collection and relevant analytic issues. This will include construction and use of measurement tools and the collection, analysis and interpretation of quantitative data and qualitative research approaches to study human phenomena. The learner is required to carry out a piece of scholarly work which demonstrates a high degree of skill in data collection, analysis, critical evaluation and effective oral and written communication (NZQA, 2000, p23).	9	90	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MNSC9.001	Critical Inquiry for Nursing Practice The aim of this course is to build on learners' existing knowledge and skills of scholarly enquiry, equipping them for research at an advanced level to inform their practice. Learners will develop the skills required to critically appraise literature related to a specific research area. They will explore the philosophical and ethical underpinnings of different research paradigms. They will be supported to identify and formulate a research questions and the selection of an appropriate research methodology and design in preparation for their research project.	9	30	Online delivery with compulsory block course
MNSC9.002	Research Project The aim of this course is to provide the learner with the guidance and support s/he requires to independently conduct a research study relevant to the discipline of nursing, as identified in MNSC9.001. The course is based on each learner's individual research project, as agreed between the learner and her/his supervisor. How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT | Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on 0800 22 55 348 and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details. Fees-free government scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

The majority of courses are offered in an online delivery mode, meaning there will be no requirement for you to physically attend classes. Other courses are available through flexible (blended/online) delivery, meaning that some of the courses do require you to attend workshops. Unless specified, face-to-face classes are held at the EIT | Te Pūkenga Hawke's Bay campus in Taradale, and the rest of your learning is carried out online. You will be notified of dates and venues prior to the commencement of your course.

Please note, for your study purposes, each 30 credit course requires 56 contact hours (i.e. equivalent to eight study days of release time). Registered nurse applicants are strongly advised to refer to their local Te Whatu Ora Postgraduate Funding Coordinator, should they require information about Health Workforce postgraduate nursing education funding.

For those of you who are new to online study, we will be offering an "Orientation to Online Learning", which will be held online. Participation is highly recommended. Please note that enrolling in a postgraduate course with an online component assumes that you have at least some basic computer knowledge and skills and your own computer or laptop (or access to one) and high speed internet access. The Orientation involves a combination of self-directed activities and various Zoom sessions. You will be notified of dates and further details prior to the start of the semester.

Applying for academic credit: There is a separate application for this.

New learners: It may be possible for us to consider credit of previous formal postgraduate study from another institution, or some recognition of prior learning. Please request an application pack from us.

EIT | **Te Pūkenga returning learners:** If you have previously completed a postgraduate health science qualification at EIT | Te Pūkenga and are progressing onto further study after a period of five years or more, you may wish to apply for credit. We recommend that you do this at time of enrolment into the new programme. Please request an application pack from us.

Existing EIT | Te Pūkenga learners who have progressed onto further study after a break of fewer than five years are not required to apply.
