Nau mai haere mai rā - welcome

Te Pōkaitahi Reo Māori (Reo Rua) (Kaupae 3) | NZ Certificate in Te Reo Māori (Level 3) is intended for those who have intermediate-level understanding of and ability in the use of te reo.

As a graduate you will have the skills and knowledge to communicate in te reo with some independence and confidence in everyday whānau, marae, social/community, workplace and/or academic contexts and in Māori environments where they feel comfortable.

Subject areas

- Intermediate (Level 3) Te Reo Māori
- Māori and marae activities (includes noho marae)
- Work-based activities

Career and study opportunities

Skills developed in this programme will enhance chances of gaining employment in a number of fields where a basic knowledge of te reo Māori is required.

Successful completion of this certificate will allow you to enrol in Te Tohu Tauihu (Kaupae 4) | NZ Certificate in Te Reo me Ngā Tikanga Māori (Level 4), in the following semester/year.

Timetable

Your study time will be made up of contact time (class times, tutorials, wānanga, noho marae) and non-contact time (your own individual study time, online learning).

Te Ūranga Waka - Hawke's Bay

Full-time day classes are scheduled between 9.00am-3.00pm, Monday to Thursday.

Wānanga (night classes) are scheduled between 5.00pm-8.00pm (day/s to be confirmed).

Te Whatukura - Te Tairāwhiti

Full-time day classes are scheduled between 9.00am-3.00pm, Monday to Thursday.

Wānanga (night classes) are scheduled between 5.30pm-8.30pm (day to be confirmed).

Entry requirements

You must have completed:

- The approved foundation programme, Te Pōkaitahi Reo Māori (Reo Rua) | NZ Certificate in Te Reo Māori (Level 2), or
- Have an equivalent qualification.

Entry with credit

You may already have some knowledge or skills (from other study or experience) that can be recognized as credit towards completing this programme. If credit is awarded, you may no longer be deemed a full-time student for allowances. Please enquire about this **before** you enrol.

Assessments

Assessments include oral, written and practical assignments. This programme is approved by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) but the programme does not consist of NZQA unit standards. It consists of NZQA approved "courses".

Facilities

Te Ūranga Waka - Hawke's Bay

The marae complex is primarily a teaching facility for Māori language and culture courses. Te Ūranga Waka facilities include a whareniui, kitchen, dining room, ablution area and new teaching spaces with video conferencing capability as well as a new art room and computer suite.

How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT | Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on 0800 22 55 348 and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details.

Fees-free government scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

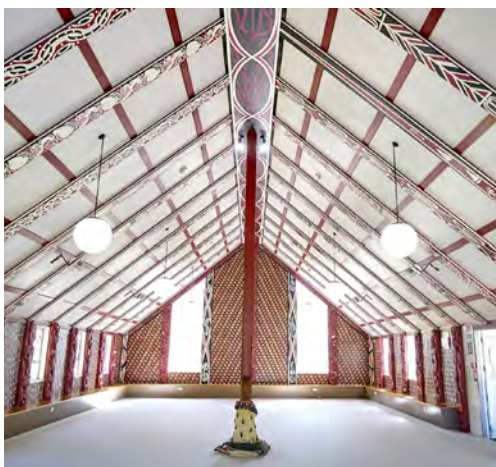
Student services levy
