Māori art is a specialised field that is highly sought nationally and internationally. As a learner of Te Toi o Ngā Rangi you will be taught by some of New Zealand's premier Māori artists who have vested many years in ensuring Māori art endures for future generations.

As a graduate of the degree you will be the face, voice and vehicle to move Māori contemporary art beyond the 21st century.

You will initially be introduced to a wide range of art disciplines, with a view to specialisation in Year Two and fine tuning your craft in Year Three. Toi Houkura's wānanga based delivery provides the opportunity to link to past traditional practices whilst allowing scope for expression in a modern context.

Te Toi o Ngā Rangi | Bachelor of Māori Visual Arts is a full-time, 360 credit degree, studied over three years. It is taught by some of Aotearoa New Zealand's premier Māori artists and is well supported by Aotearoa New Zealand's Māori arts sector, Māori communities and a range of leading Māori art specialists across the nation.

You will develop your creativity through focusing on art practice underpinned by traditional research methods. As studies are primarily Tairāwhiti based, academic research is informed by te reo Māori me ona tikanga o Te Tairāwhiti.

Courses start at level 5 in the first year and all subjects are fully prescribed, initially introducing you to a broad range of art disciplines. However, in subsequent years you will be offered a selection of options to complement compulsory courses and support your art speciality development.

Toihoukura has a comprehensive annual exhibition schedule and marae based wānanga programme which is embedded across all year levels to guarantee the integrity of the practice of art within a Māori paradigm.

Timetable

Your study time will be made up of contact time (class times, tutorials, industry-based learning) and non-contact time (your own individual study time, online learning).

Contact time

On-campus classes are usually scheduled between 9.00am-3.00pm, Monday to Friday including self-directed studio practice time. Late nights are negotiated with academic staff on an as needed basis.

Additional costs

- You will be expected to make a contribution to wānanga, trips and/or accommodation (approximately \$250). You are able to access the course related costs component from StudyLink for additional costs.

Entry requirements

A person is eligible to apply for entry who:

- Has attained University Entrance (UE)
- Can satisfactorily prove that they have the potential to succeed on the programme
- Level placement, cross credit and/or recognition of prior learning as approved by the Academic Committee

Standard discretionary entrance guidelines will apply, Please contact us to discuss.

Selection criteria and process

An offer of place on the programme will be extended to applicants who meet the entry requirements and demonstrate the potential to successfully complete the programme on the basis of:

- Expression of interest letter
- A portfolio of work that represents the applicant's level of achievement
- An interview
- Evidence of ability to cope with the academic demands of the programme (for those without a University Entrance qualification)
- Curriculum vitae (optional)
- References

Applicants who submit a formal application to enrol on the programme and who meet the entry criteria will be required to submit a portfolio of work and attend an interview.

The interview provides an opportunity for academic staff to confirm the authenticity of the applicant's portfolio, appraise and discuss work in considering the applicant's suitability for admission. It will determine whether an applicant is offered a place on the programme and if so at what level of the programme the applicant will be offered a place. The interviews will include two or more academic staff.

Māori/English language entry requirements

Applicants will need to demonstrate fluency, at a level sufficient to academically succeed in the course, in either Te Reo Māori or English.

Applicants who have the language fluency to support it may complete their assessments in Te Reo Māori.

Applicants from countries in which English is not a primary spoken language, who propose to complete their assessments in English, must have an acceptable level of English language fluency prior to enrolment in the programme. This maybe demonstrated in a variety of ways, including successful study of a programme in which English was the language of instruction, completion of a New Zealand Certificate in English language (Level 4 Academic), approved scores on IELTS tests (6.0 Academic with no band score lower than 5.5), or completion of either an EIT | Te Pūkenga assessment or accepted international equivalents.

Standard discretionary entrance guidelines will apply.

Entry with credit

Recognition of prior learning

Cross Credit (CC) and Recognition of Prior Learning (RPL) will be in accordance with EIT | Te Pūkenga regulations and institutional guidelines. Level Placement (LP) is a type of recognition of prior learning that has special relevance to this degree and regulations that are particular to this degree are dealt with below.

The maximum amount of credit achievable by CC or RPL is 240 credits.

Acceptance of RPL and LP will be at the discretion of EIT | Te Pūkenga. You will still need to be interviewed with a submission of portfolio.

Level placement

Applicants to the programme may apply for level placement or it may be recommended by academic staff during the application interview.

Applicants for level placement will provide evidence of relevant experience and achievement through the selection process. Applicants must also demonstrate the ability to cope with the academic demands of the level at which they are being placed. If an applicant is applying for level placement, it is recommended that they submit a curriculum vitae as part of their application for admission to the programme.

Once an applicant's level placement has been formally approved, they will be granted academic credit for those courses between the entry level and the level at which they have been placed, that is, those courses at level 5 and above from which they have been exempted.

Facilities

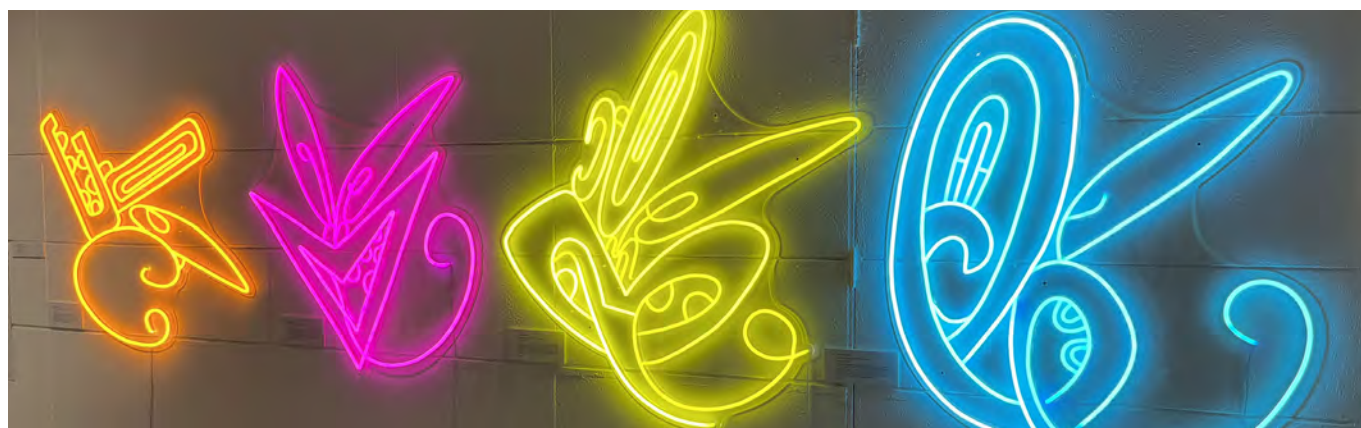
Toihoukura consists of a number of studio spaces, a workshop, communal kitchen, two art galleries and office areas for academic and support staff.

Assessments

This programme is primarily an art practice, studio and professional practice based programme, however there is some academic writing/presentations involved. Assessment activities are varied, but ultimately the making of contemporary Māori art is the focal point.

Year 13 scholarship

How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT | Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on 0800 22 55 348 and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details.

Fees-free government scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

Student services levy

The student services levy is a compulsory non-tuition fee that is charged to students enrolled at EIT | Te Pūkenga. The levy is to contribute to the provision of quality student services that support learning. The funds received by EIT | Te Pūkenga from the levy are ring-fenced, meaning they can only be spent on student services.
