
Maori art is a specialist field that is highly sought after nationally and internationally.

Ka Tipu te Whaihanga is a unique certificate which is kaupapa and wānanga based. You will have access to recognised tohunga and leading Maori art specialists across a range of artforms.

Te Ao Maori is interwoven throughout the program and provides a basis for self-expression in the creation of artworks using a variety of mediums.

You will be introduced to a wide range of art disciplines, with a view to specialisation if you opt to continue your Toihoukura journey. Toihoukura's wānanga based delivery provides the opportunity to link past traditional practices whilst allowing scope for expression in a modern context. Successful completion of Ka Tipu te Whaihanga | NZ Certificate in Nga Toi enables you to apply directly for the Te Toi o Ngā Rangi | Bachelor of Māori Visual Arts at Toihoukura.

Ka Tipu te Whaihanga (Kaupae 4) | NZ Certificate in Ngā Toi (Level 4) will develop your creativity through focusing on Māori art practice and methods. Ākonga at Toihoukura come from all corners of the world, however studies are primarily informed by te reo Māori me ngā tikanga o Te Tairāwhiti.

Toihoukura has a busy exhibition schedule for all year levels with shows not only in our own gallery Maia but nationally and internationally. Marae and wānanga based learning continues to be a main focus ensuring our art remains culturally authentic and connected. Upon graduating you will have the skills and knowledge to be able to:

- Produce Māori art works informed by an understanding of design and concepts informed by traditional narratives (mōteatea, waiata and kapahaka) and te reo Māori me ona tikanga.
- Create Māori artworks using safe and effective processes.
- Have a sound academic base to enable you to proceed to degree level study.

Career and study opportunities

Successful completion of the Ka Tipu te Whaihanga (Kaupae 4) | NZ Certificate in Ngā Toi (Level 4) gives you the ability to enter the first year of the degree programme, Te Toi o Ngā Rangi | Bachelor of Māori Visual Arts.

You may also wish to move into:

- · Self-employment in the visual arts
- · Commercial art environments
- Community art projects

Timetable

Your study time will be made up of contact time, wānanga, kanohi ki te kanohi (face-to-face), community engagement, class and studio time, tutorials and noncontact self-directed studio practice time and a possibility of online learning.

Contact time

On-campus classes are usually scheduled between 9.00am-3.00pm, Monday to Friday, including selfdirected studio practice time. Late nights are negotiated with academic staff on an as needed basis.

Additional costs

• You will be expected to made a contribution to wānanga, trips and/or accommodation. You will be supplied with some art resources but you will also be expected to contribute to buying specialised or extra materials that we will not be able to provide.

Entry requirements

All applicants must attend an interview with the Principal Tutor(s). A basic art portfolio with drawings or samples is essential.

Academic requirements

- Applicants will require a minimum of 10 credits NCEA Level 1 from any Literacy sub field or domain. These skills can be assessed in English and Te Reo Māori.
- For applicants without these NCEA credits or equivalent, a pass in NCEA Level 1 English and/or Te Reo Māori meets the academic entry requirements, as do NQF qualifications of an equivalent or higher level which demonstrate achievement in these discipline areas.
- Applicants over 20 are classified as mature students. Mature students with life skills and/or work experience who do not meet the stated entry requirements but have the equivalent ability and experience are encouraged to apply.

Māori/English language entry requirements

Applicants will need to demonstrate fluency, at a level sufficient to academically succeed in the course, in either Te Reo Māori or English.

Applicants who have the language fluency to support it may complete their assessments in Te Reo Māori.

Applicants from countries in which English is not a primary spoken language, who propose to complete their assessments in English, must have an acceptable level of English language fluency prior to enrolment in the programme. This may be demonstrated in a variety of ways, including successful study of a programme in which English was the language of instruction, completion of a New Zealand Certificate in English language (Level 4 Academic), approved scores on IELTS tests (6.0 Academic with no band score lower than 5.5), or completion of either an EIT | Te Pūkenga assessment or accepted international equivalents.

Standard discretionary entrance guidelines will apply.

How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT \mid Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on 0800 22 55 348 and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details. **Fees-free government scheme:** Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

Student services levy

The student services levy is a compulsory non-tuition fee that is charged to students enrolled at EIT | Te Pūkenga. The levy is to contribute to the provision of quality student services that support learning. The funds received by EIT | Te Pūkenga from the levy are ringfenced, meaning they can only be spent on student services.
