NZ Certificate in Primary Industry Skills

Sustainable Horticulture

Level 2

The NZ Certificate in Primary Industry Skills (Sustainable Horticulture) provides entry level skills for those in the primary industries with a focus on horticulture production.

During this programme You will learn basic gardening techniques from seed germination to growing and harvesting, how to set up a vegetable garden, and how to plant and manage it.

Organic practices will form an integral part of this programme, and you'll also learn how to feed your plants and soil, make natural fertilisers and more!

Enjoy getting your hands in the soil and understand the simple ways to grow your own plants and produce.

Our approach will look at sustainable methods focusing on water management, soil care and garden ecosystems. As a graduate you will be able to undertake a range of seasonal horticultural activities.

Grow your skills for primary industries

A range of horticulture activities will be delivered and during the length of your studies you will complete the following approved NZQA qualification:

- NZ Certificate in Primary Industry Skills (Level 2)
40 credits

In particular, the programme is designed to:

- Provide an introduction to growing and horticulture
- Provide a pathway for ongoing and further study in primary industries

This qualification provides entry level skills for those new to gardening and horticulture or beginning a career in the primary industries. It is an applied practical programme.

Career and study opportunities

Graduates of this qualification will have the skills and knowledge to obtain entry level roles in primary industries.

On successful completion of this Primary Industry programme you may choose to continue your studies by enrolling in the NZ Certificate in Horticulture (Level 3).

Timetable

Your study involves contact time (class times), and non-contact time (your own independent study time).

Contact time

On-campus classes will vary depending on your enrolment and may include daytime, evening or weekend classes.

Non-contact time

You should plan to spend seven hours of individual study per week excluding scheduled classroom time.

Each course in this programme requires independent learning outside of classroom hours.

Entry requirements

This is an open entry programme which means no formal qualifications are required. You must be aged 16 or over and you are required to have a reasonable reading level in order to cope with the programme and to carry out written instruction.

You must also be physically able to complete the programme specific outcomes.

English language entry requirements

All applicants must demonstrate an acceptable level of English language fluency prior to acceptance in the programme. For international students, ways in which English language fluency may be demonstrated include the following:

- Successful study of a programme in which English was the language of instruction (subject to the conditions in EIT's Database for English Language Proficiency (DELP))
- Completion of a New Zealand Certificate in English Language (Level 3 with any endorsement)
- IELTS Academic score of 5, with no band score lower than 5, achieved in a single test within the two years preceding enrolment
- Accepted international equivalents to the above IELTS scores (see equivalency tables in the DELP)

Literacy and numeracy skills

A literacy and numeracy assessment is part of the preparation for all level one to three programmes. This is a national requirement from the Tertiary Education Commission (TEC). This information gives your tutors information on what you already know to help them provide the help that you may need in your studies.

There are two assessments. The first assessment will take place within the first three weeks of the programme. The second will be a week or two before you finish the programme. This final assessment will show how you have improved with your Literacy and Numeracy skills.

There will always be a tutor to help you when doing the assessment. The most important thing to know about this assessment is that you cannot fail. You will merely get information on your literacy and numeracy skills. The result will not have an impact on any of your assessment marks in your course work.

Assessments

At the end of this qualification you will take away a portfolio of work that you have completed. This will be an excellent resource for you to use in any future learning or to give to any potential employers.

How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT | Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on **0800 22 55 348** and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details.

Fees-free government scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to FeesFree.govt.nz and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

Student services levy

The student services levy is a compulsory non-tuition fee that is charged to students enrolled at EIT | Te Pūkenga. The levy is to contribute to the provision of quality student services that support learning. The funds received by EIT | Te Pūkenga from the levy are ring-fenced, meaning they can only be spent on student services.
