Level 5

This programme is for graduates of the Level 4 programme who wish to gain an advanced understanding and ability in the use of Te Reo - kia tika, kia rere, kia Māori. At the end of the programme you will be able to communicate independently in te reo, express ideas in a wide range of familiar and some less familiar situations with fluency and flexibility.

Play a part in shaping a positive social, political and economic future for Aotearoa New Zealand, a thorough understanding of te reo Māori and tikanga is essential, as special taonga, to be shared with all New Zealanders.

Non-contact Time

You should plan to spend ten hours of individual study per course per week including scheduled classroom time.

Additional costs

- \$50 approximately for stationery per semester
- \$50 approximately for textbooks per semester
- \$80 kapa haka uniform (faculty t-shirt, black trousers or black skirt - one-off optional cost)
- \$50 approximately for marae visits, tangihanga and/or field trips per semester (not applicable for night class students)
- You require access to a computer, laptop or tablet throughout your studies

Entry requirements

You must have completed the approved foundation programme, Te Tohu Tauihu (Kaupae 4) | NZ Certificate in Te Reo me Ngā Tikanga (Level 4) or have an equivalent qualification or life experience.

English language entry requirement

An interview is part of the acceptance process to determine capability of understanding a third language.

Entry with credit

You may already have some knowledge or skills (from other study or experience) that can be recognised as credit towards completing this programme. If credit is awarded, you may no longer be deemed a full-time student for allowances. Please enquire about this first **before** you enrol.



Facilities

Te Ūranga Waka - Hawke's Bay

The marae complex is primarily a teaching facility for Māori language and culture courses. Te Ūranga Waka facilities include a wharenuī, kitchen, dining room, ablution area and new teaching spaces with video conferencing capability as well as a new art room and computer suite.

Te Whatukura - Te Tairāwhiti

Te Whatukura facilities include a kitchen, dining area, classrooms, video conferencing equipment and a computer suite.

Assessments

Assessments include oral, written and practical assignments. This programme is approved by the New Zealand Qualifications Authority (NZQA) but the programme does not consist of NZQA unit standards. It consists of NZQA approved "courses".

Year 13 scholarship

EIT | Te Pūkenga offers a limited number of Year 13 Scholarships to eligible Taupō, Hawke's Bay and Tairāwhiti (Gisborne) learners who are beginning an undergraduate degree in 2024. You can study any one of our 13 degrees or selected level 5 certificate and diploma programmes that pathway into a degree.

MS5.101	Te Kahikatoa Marae Customs and Practices I Extends ākonga knowledge of marae structures, protocols, social, cultural and ritual situations. It teaches them how to participate in those situations at their level of ability. It also teaches ākonga some of the concepts, beliefs and traditions which underlie the physical structures and social, cultural and ritual practices.	5	15	HB - S1 TC - FY
MS5.202	Te Whanaketanga Māori Language I Focuses on building confidence and accuracy in the use of te reo Māori in the four elements of whakarongo (listening), kōrero (speaking), pānui (reading) and tuhituhi (writing).	5	30	HB - S1 TC - S1
MS5.204	Te Pikinga Māori Language II Focuses on increasing confidence and accuracy in the use of te reo Māori in the four elements of whakarongo, kōrero, pānui and tuhituhi.	5	30	HB - S2 TC - S2

MS5.401	He Kōwhiringa-ā-Reo Language-Teaching Communication Activities This course focuses on designing, carrying out and evaluating communication teaching activities appropriate to ākonga needs. (Teaching will be in Māori and English.)	5	15	TC - S2
MS5.501	Te Ao Māori o Neherā Traditional Māori Society This course discusses traditional Māori society in pre-European times focusing on social organisation and structure and on cultural and economic activities. It goes on to look at colonisation and its impact on Māori society to about 1900.	5	15	HB - S2 TC - S2
MS5.701	Te Puoro me ngā Taonga Whakatangitangi Māori Music and Musical Instruments Introduces ākonga to Māori music and teaches them to play a variety of instruments and perform waiata and haka. MS5.711	He Pūkenga Mahi Kōhatu Māori Introduction to Māori Stone Tool Technology This course aims to develop ākonga knowledge and skills related to the theory and practice of stone tool technology in pre-European-contact Māori society.	5	15	HB - S1
MS5.750	Ngā Tatangi a te Whare Karioi I Māori Performing Arts I This course provides ākonga with foundation knowledge of traditional and contemporary Māori Performing Arts. It develops their knowledge of haka, mōteatea and waiata.	5	15	HB - S1 TC - S1

How to enrol

There is an easy 3-step process to follow when enrolling at EIT | Te Pūkenga.

Step 1

Check out eit.ac.nz to see the programmes available for you to study. A copy of the course information for each programme is available on our website.

Step 2

You can now use your RealMe verified identity to apply for study at EIT | Te Pūkenga. If you use your RealMe verified identity you will no longer be sent a copy of your application form to sign. You also will not need to provide us with a copy of your primary ID.

If you apply online without using RealMe then you will be sent a summary of your enrolment to check and sign. It will also include course selection forms which you need to complete and return. Your enrolment cannot progress until you have sent the summary and forms back to us.

You can also apply using a paper enrolment form. Please call us on **0800 22 55 348** and we will send you one out.

You will receive an acceptance letter from your Faculty with programme information. This will include the start date of your study and any special information regarding your programme. Depending on your chosen programme of study, you may be invited to attend an interview before you are accepted.

Step 3

Arrangement for full payment of enrolment fees must be made before the start of your programme. You will receive an invoice with payment details.

Fees-free government scheme: Tertiary education is fees-free for eligible domestic tertiary students. To check if you are eligible, go to [FeesFree.govt.nz](https://feesfree.govt.nz) and enter your National Student Number (NSN). If you are not eligible you will be responsible for paying your fees.

Scholarships and grants: Scholarships and grants make life easier by helping to cover your fees, other costs and living expenses while you study. You don't always need to be an academic high-flyer to qualify. You can find out more about scholarships and other options for paying your fees at eit.ac.nz.

StudyLink: If you need to pay for your own study you can choose to apply for your Student Loan and Student Allowance with StudyLink. You should do this early, even if you haven't yet been accepted on your programme. You can change your details later if anything changes. Visit studylink.govt.nz to find out more about StudyLink.

Student services levy

The student services levy is a compulsory non-tuition fee that is charged to students enrolled at EIT | Te Pūkenga. The levy is to contribute to the provision of quality student services that support learning.
